Exceptions:

- Timing varies across USDA climate zones zones within Virginia range from 8a in the Virginia Beach area to 5b along the West Virginia border
- Prune anytime to correct vandalism damage and hazards created by equipment or weather
- Hedges maintained formally (tight shapes) require more pruning than hedges maintained informally (in their natural form)
- For boxwoods, if not shearing, follow pruning guidelines from the American Boxwood Society
